The Buncombe County Tourism Development Authority is the public authority created in 1983 by an act of the North Carolina Legislature to oversee the collection and investment of occupancy taxes paid by travelers who stay overnight in commercial lodging establishments, such as hotels and motels, bed and breakfast operations, and vacation rentals such as Airbnb and VRBOs. The members of the Buncombe County TDA Board have a fiduciary responsibility to ensure that the tax dollars are spent in accordance with the specific legislation governing their use.

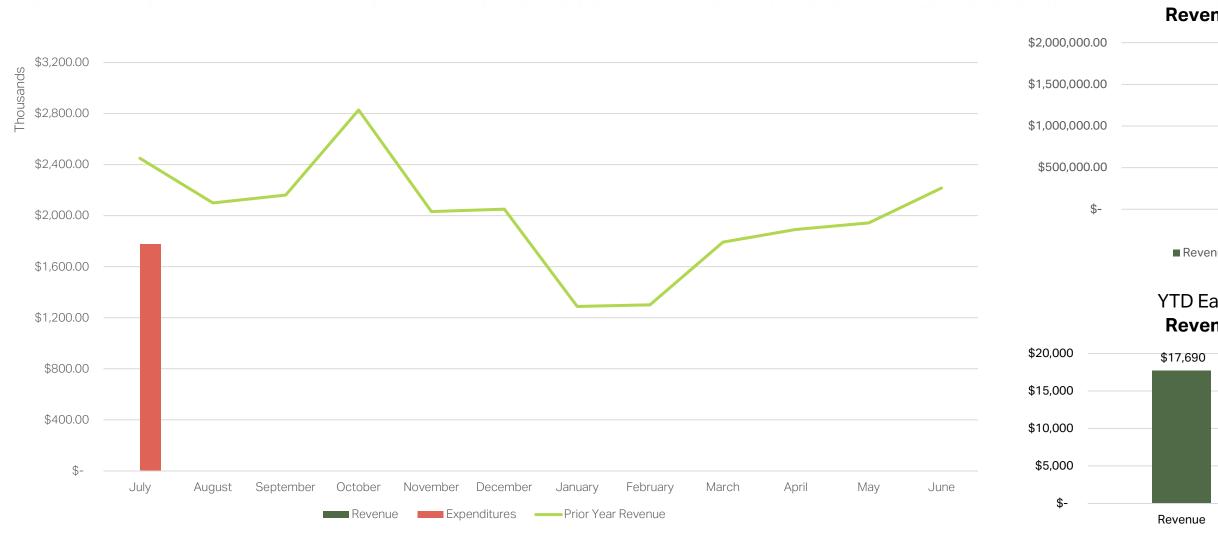

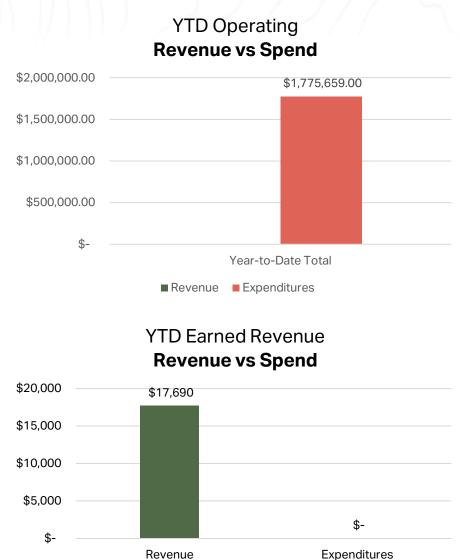

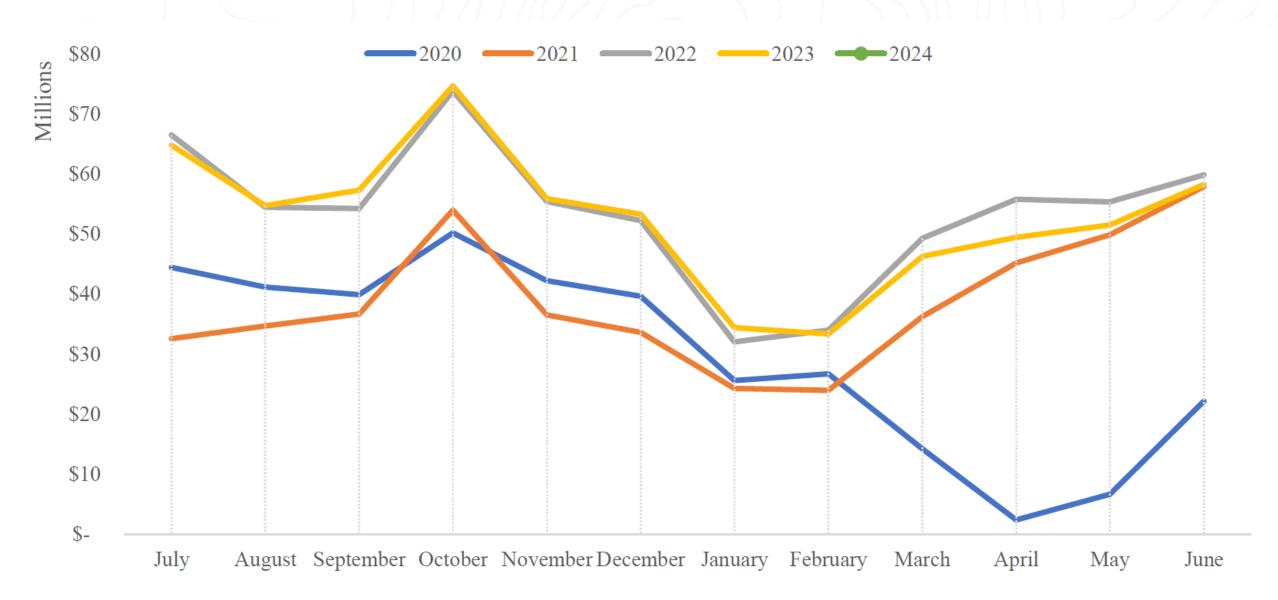

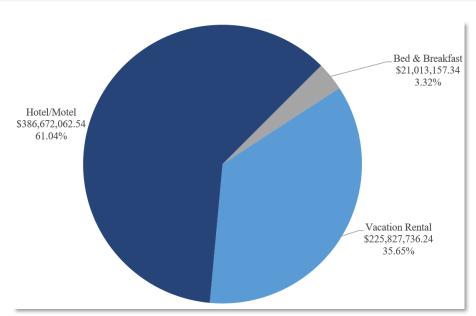

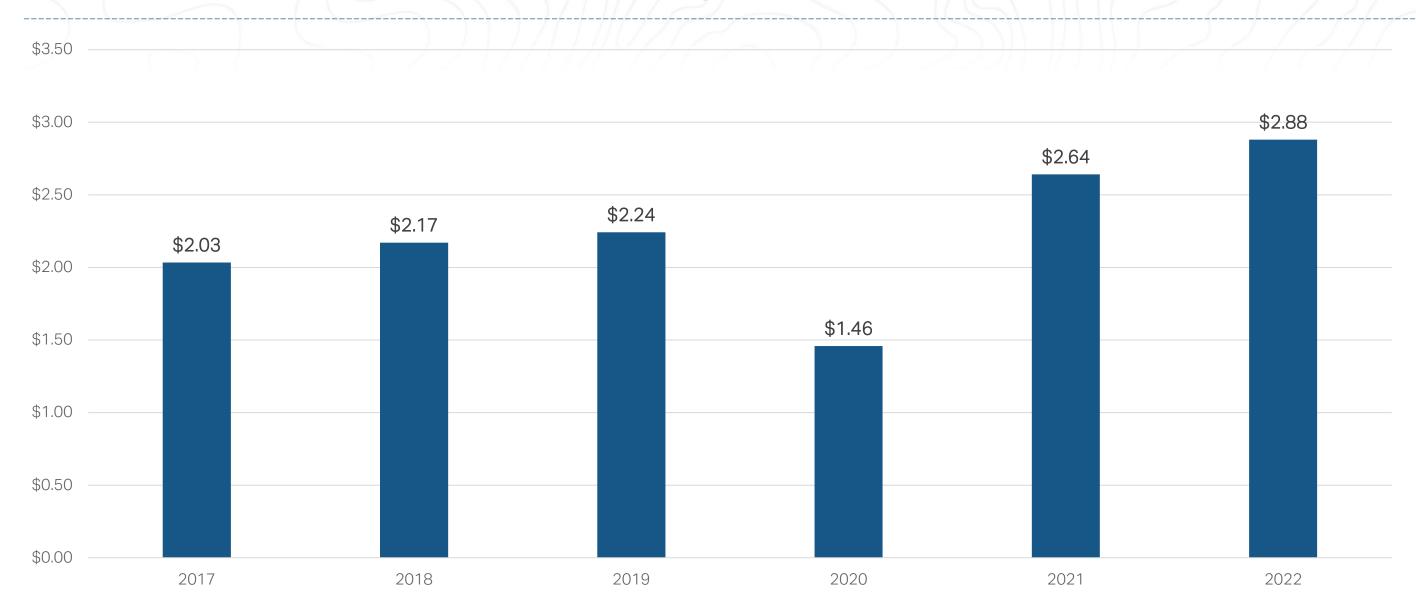

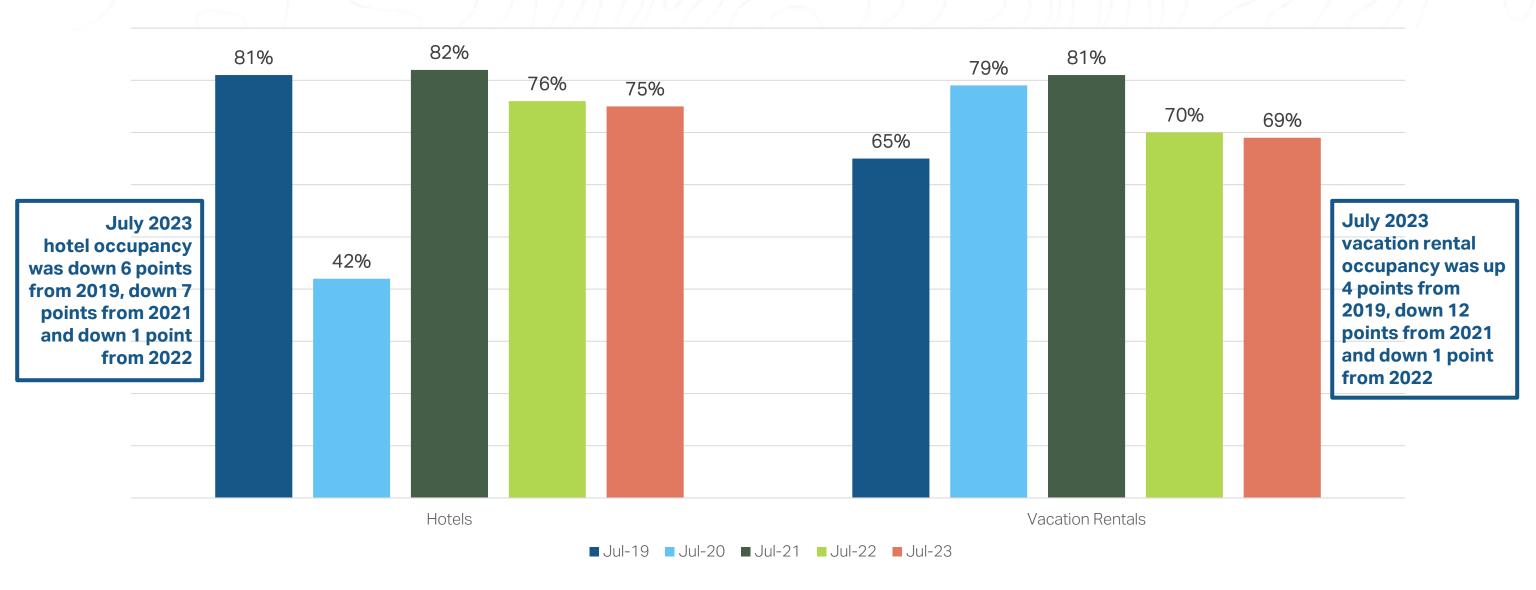

#### **JULY LODGING OCCUPANCY**



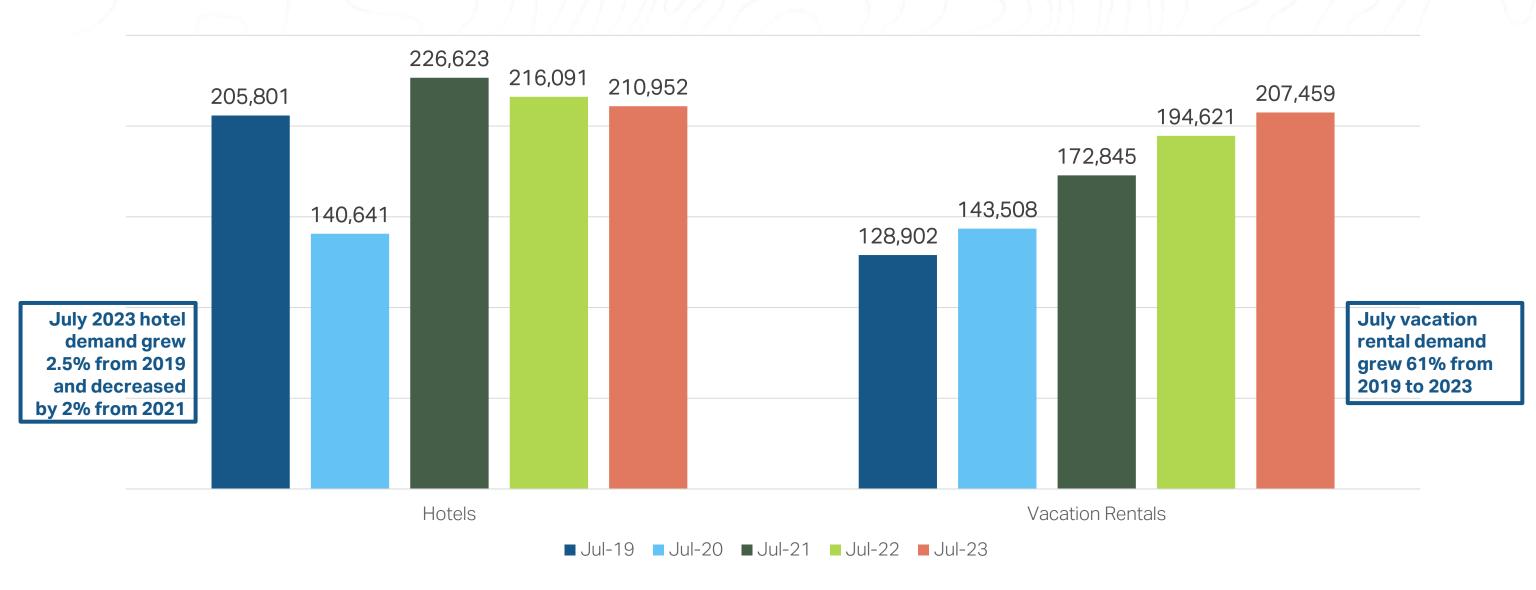

#### **KAREN CRAGNOLIN PARK & GREENWAY**

TPDF supported project opened August 26

- A missing link in a ribbon of parks, river access sites, greenways and concessions, this 5.33-acre park now connects Amboy Road River Park and Carrier Park.
- Phase I included, a paved path connecting to the adjacent parks, educational signage throughout, and functional stormwater amenities.
- \$300,000 investment approved by BCTDA in October 2022.

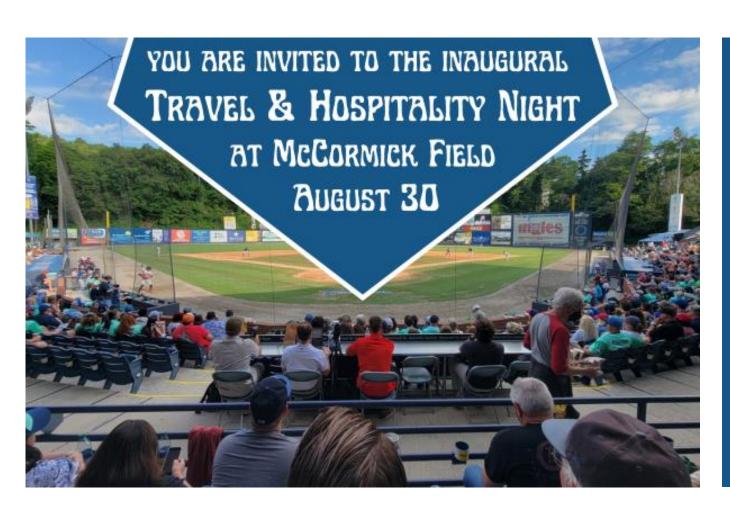

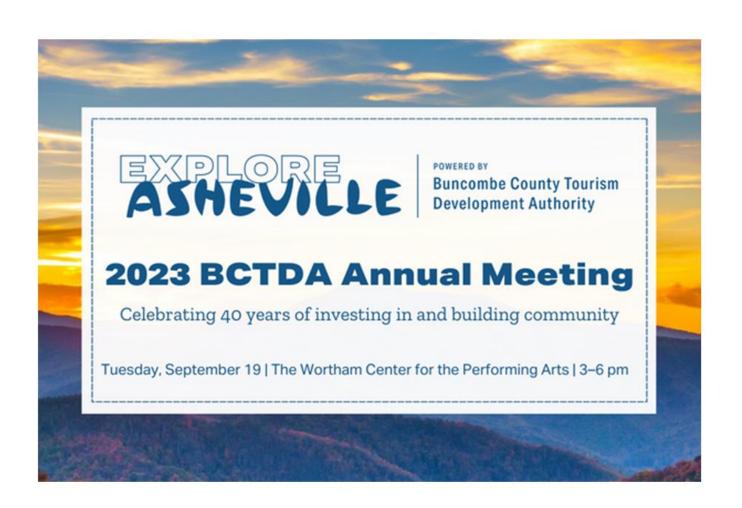

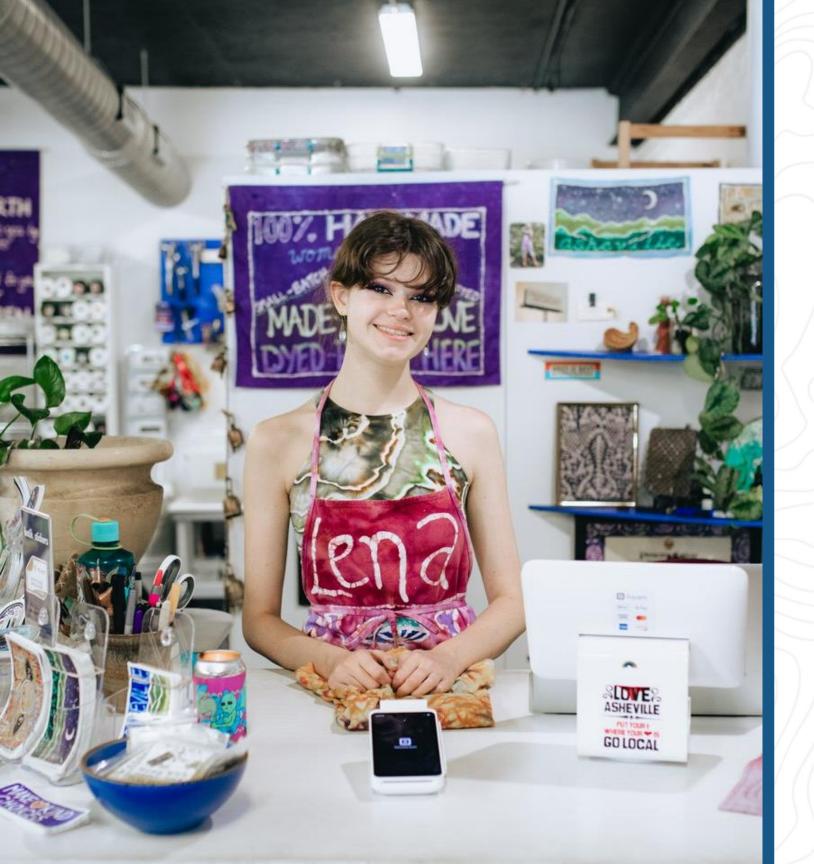

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

Explore Asheville aims to support workforce development within our visitor sector

- Workforce development is one of the challenges for the visitor sector in Buncombe County, as with much of the country
- A thriving workforce is essential for our community's livelihood; in 2022, 31,600 people were employed in the county's LHT industry
- Due to the July 2022 legislation change, festivals and cultural events grants and sponsorships can be funded through the operating budget; with the \$250,000 Earned Revenue Fund, Explore Asheville aims to support workforce development within our industry
- Tourism Economics supported with preliminary data gathering about the Leisure, Hospitality, & Tourism (LHT) workforce
- Staff workshopped the findings with a group of industry partners; today, we'll review some of the insights
- The benchmarking analysis and additional exploration will inform what strategies are ultimately put into action

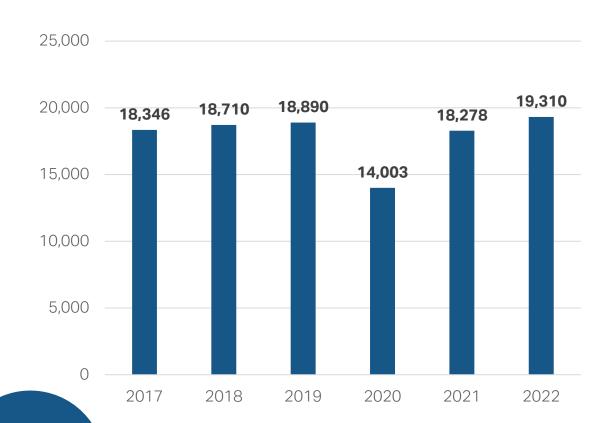

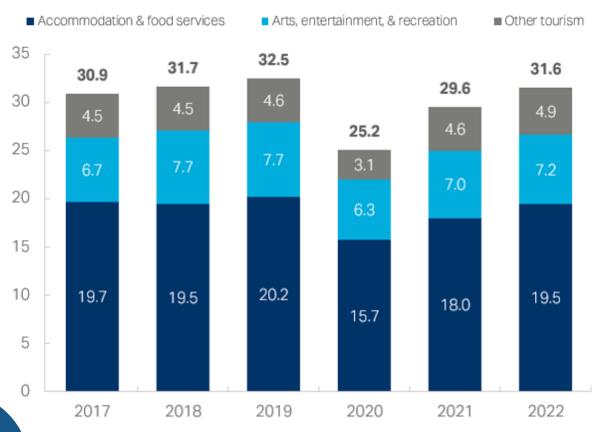

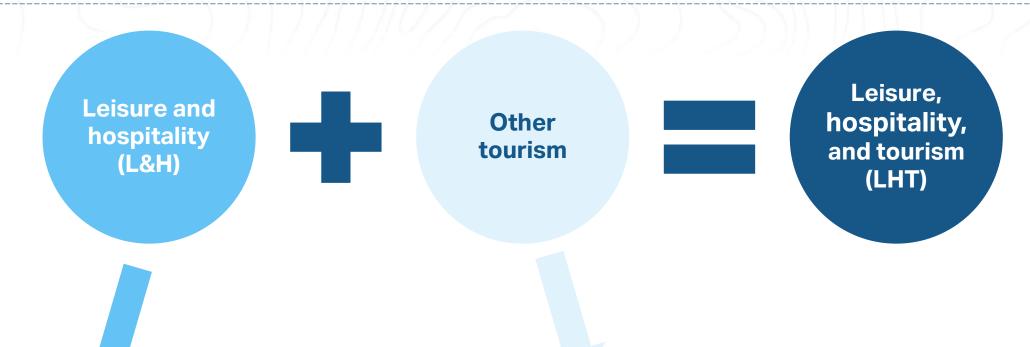

## INDUSTRY OVERVIEW



#### LEISURE, HOSPITALITY, & TOURISM INDUSTRY SUB-SECTORS

Inclusive of Full and Part Time Jobs

In 2022, 31,600 people were employed in Buncombe County's LHT industry, of which 62% were in the accommodation and food services sub-sectors.

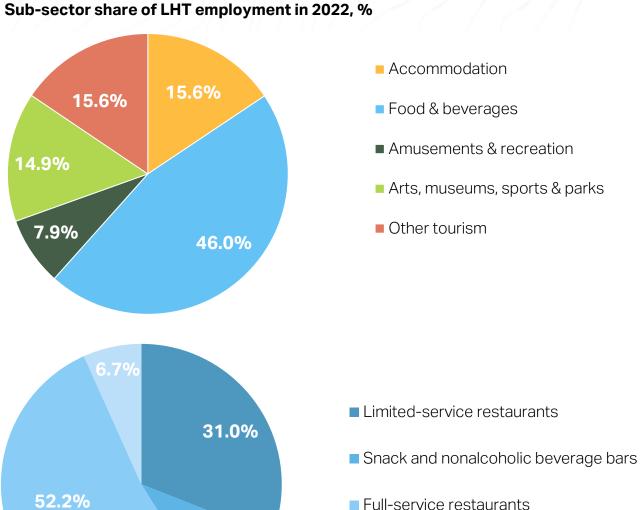

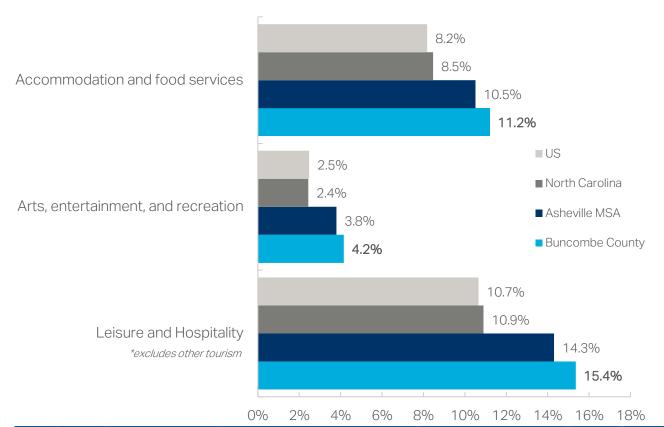


#### **L&H EMPLOYMENT IN CONTEXT**

In Buncombe County, the percentage of jobs in leisure and hospitality and the wages exceed the state

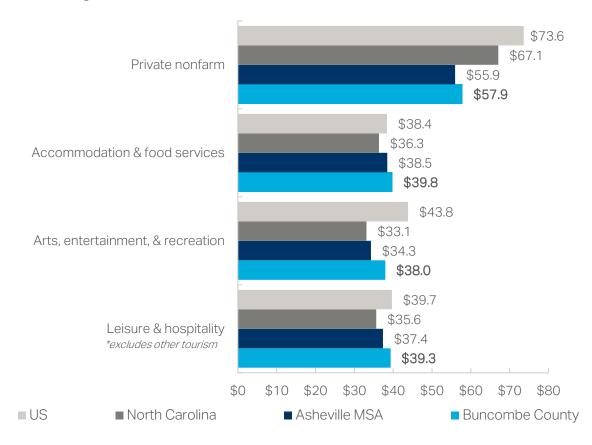
L&H jobs are more important to Asheville MSA and Buncombe County than North Carolina and the United States. Both Asheville MSA and Buncombe County had higher percentages of private nonfarm jobs in leisure and hospitality and in the L&H sub-sectors of accommodations and food services and arts, entertainment, and recreation than state and nation in 2022.

#### % of private nonfarm jobs in 2022



L&H workers wages in Buncombe County lagged the private nonfarm average of \$57,900 in 2022, a trend seen nationally. But real L&H wages (excluding other tourism) in Buncombe County have grown faster than the Asheville MSA, state, and nation since 2013, paying more than the state average, yet less than the national average.

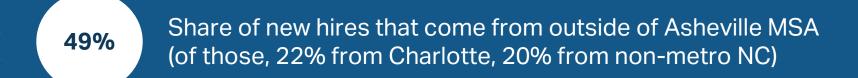

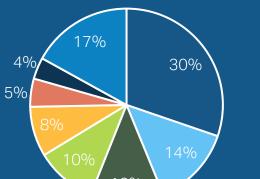




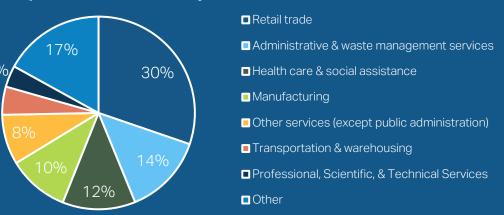








% of separations in new industry





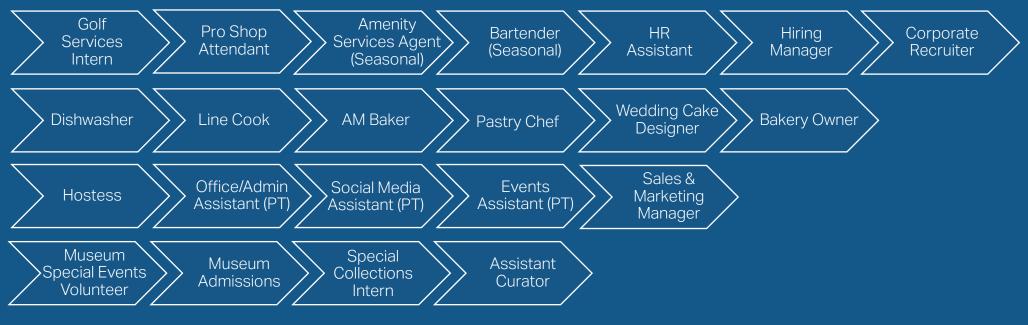

#### CONSIDERATIONS FOR ATTRACTING WORKERS

- Foster greater awareness of the industry's integration with the broader economy to help jobseekers of various educational backgrounds and interests seek a career within LHT
- Promote and highlight various career paths within the LHT industry to younger audiences through internship opportunities, career workshops, webinars, panels, or information sessions that enhance knowledge about careers in LHT

#### **CONSIDERATIONS FOR ADVANCING WORKERS**

- Promote and improve access to skills building opportunities for employees seeking career mobility and higher pay
- Provide workers with clear pathways and goals for career advancement to help them plan for a longer career within the industry
- Help employees in LHT find meaning in their careers to enhance motivation and performance
- Establish avenues through which LHT workers can remain in the industry when changing roles

#### **CONSIDERATIONS FOR RETAINING WORKERS**

- Improve measures that boost employee satisfaction, which may help retain workers for longer
- Pay attention to the needs and aspirations of different age groups and tailor LHT job pathways to retain workers.
- Workers are increasingly demanding more benefits in addition to wage compensation; furthermore, flexible work schedules are increasingly desirable and an important consideration for employees when choosing future jobs
